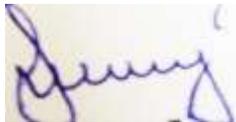

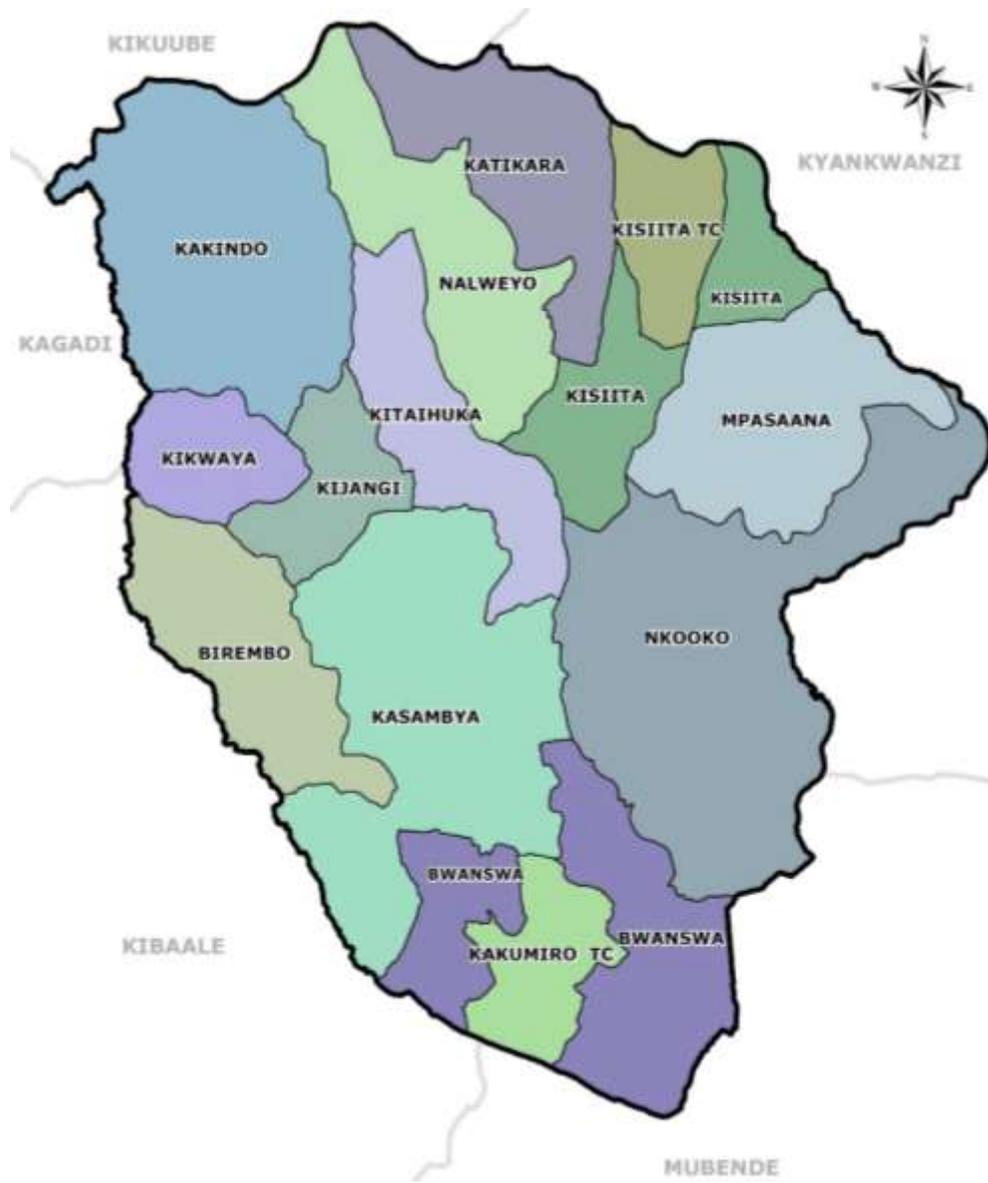
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Figure 1: MAP OF KAKUMIRO DISTRICT SHOWING LOWER LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

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CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

Background

1.1 Profile of the Local Government

1.1.1 Location and Size of the Local Government

The District Township of Kakumiro which doubles as the District Headquarters is approximately 182kms by road North West of Kampala, Uganda's capital city. The District is one of the largest districts in the country. It covers a total area of approximately 1,699.4 sq. kms. Kakumiro District is located in the Mid-Western part of the country. The District is bordered by Kibaale and Kagadi Districts West, Kikuube District to the North, Kyankwanzi District to the East, and Mubende District to the South.

1.1.2 Historical Profile

Kakumiro District was created by Government of Uganda and became effective on 1st July 2016 when Kibaale District was split into three creating the current Districts of Kagadi, Kakumiro and Kibaale.

1.1.3 Geographical Profile (Climate, Vegetation, Topology, Mineral resources, soils, water bodies)

1.1.3.1 Climate

Kakumiro District has a favourable climate. It enjoys a bi-modal rainfall type which varies between 1000 mm-1500 mm per annum i.e moderate to high rainfall. Rainfall comes in two peaks, one from March to May and the second from September to December. However, Temperatures are relatively high varying between 15⁰c and 30⁰c.

The bi-modal type of rainfall is conducive for rain fed agricultural production throughout the year and crops mainly grown include bananas, tobacco, coffee, maize, beans and tea. Up-land rice and cocoa are increasingly gaining importance in the district.

1.1.3.2 Vegetation

There are three broad categories of vegetation in the district namely: the modified equatorial type, the wooded savannah mosaic and savannah grassland.

The modified equatorial vegetation covers a greater of the district especially in the Sub counties of Kakindo, Igayaza and parts of Nalweyo. This type of vegetation used to be equatorial in nature but has been modified as a result of human activity.

The wooded savannah mosaic covers a greater part of the district and forms a transitional zone from the modified equatorial vegetation to the open savannah grassland. It is common in the Sub Counties of Kasambya, Birembo and some parts of Bwanswa.

The savannah grassland is typical in areas where human activity has modified the wooded savannah mosaic. It is mainly found in the Sub Counties of Katikara, Kisiita Mpasana and Nkooko sub-counties.

The thick forests especially those on private land are being used for timber harvesting although this poses a threat of environmental degradation since reforestation and afforestation are very limited. The relative price of timber and its products in the district is low compared to other districts and the District is a major source of timber to the Kampala market.

The open grassland and thicket promote livestock farming although most of such range lands have not yet been properly developed.

1.1.3.3 Topography

Kakumiro District is part of a central plateau with an altitudinal range of about 2000- 4000 ft. while one of the highest points is Magoma hills (5100 ft. above sea level) in Kasambya sub-county - Bugangaizi West County.

The hilly and rocky relief presents challenges during construction and maintenance of roads and buildings and makes agricultural production difficult like through inducing soil erosion.

The relatively flat areas of Kisiita, parts of Nkooko and Nalweyo are generally dry with a low water table making provision of safe water through low cost technologies rather difficult while hilly areas have got many natural springs.

1.1.3.4 Soils

The process of erosion and accumulation that acted upon the land surfaces gave rise to several types of soils in Kakumiro District. In exception of the lowlands which are covered by alluvial and lake deposits, the soils of the district are of ferrallitic type. Productivity of these soils largely depends on favourable rainfall, adequate depth and maintenance of the humic top soil. However,

some clay deep loams of in some parts of Bugangaizi catena are sufficiently fertile to support a diversity of crops.

There are basically 2 soil mapping units in Kakumiro District namely Buwekula Catena and Kamusenene series. Buwekula Catena covers 90% of Bugangaizi West and East counties and comprises three major types of granitic soils namely: shallow loams, Red clay loams and Brown gravelly clay loams. Shallow Loams have moderate acidity with moderate productivity and mainly support the growing of Tobacco and Coffee.

Like climate the rich soil endowment provides an opportunity for the growing of a variety of crops as already highlighted above. However there is evidence of loss of soil fertility through leaching especially where agricultural production is done in formerly forested areas.

1.1.3.5 Wetlands

Wetlands cover 0.5% of the total district area. There are 3 wetland systems in the district namely the primary, secondary and tertiary wet land systems. Examples of primary wet land systems include, Nkusi and Kafu riverine wet lands all of which drain into Lake Albert. Secondary wetland systems drain into the primary wet land systems examples of which include, Mpongo. The tertiary wet land systems form the original catchment for all the other wet land systems. There are a number of such wet lands some of which are permanent and others seasonal. Examples include seasonal wetland, Kibuguta, Nyabigango, Nyabatende, and others.

The Sub Counties of Nkooko, Mpasaana, Kisiita and parts of Nalweyo and Kakindo have got seasonal wet land systems which are fragile for human activity.

Wetlands form boundaries for most administrative units and are a good source of raw materials for the hand craft industry which mainly employs women. Rudimental fishing is also done in these wet lands by the adjacent communities especially mud fish which is a delicacy and nutrition boost. Wet lands are a good source of clay and sand which have been used during the construction of public and private facilities. This is also evidenced by the various brick making and sand excavation points in these wet lands which mainly employ the male youths. Permanent wet lands ease development of safe water sources especially deep and shallow wells since they act as water reservoirs. However, road construction through these wetlands is rather difficult and expensive and this justifies the high demand for more culverts in most of the Sub Counties.

According to the previous table, the total population for Kakumiro stands at **559594**, with **254855** (45.5%) males and **304739 (54.5%)** females. Between 2014 and 2022, population of Kakumiro has grown at a rate of 8.3 % per annum. Such a rapid population growth has exerted pressure on the available public utilities and other resources.

This growth rate is rather abnormal, but can mainly be explained by the continued influx of people from densely populated Districts. The total fertility rate is also relatively high due to low levels of Family Planning prevalence in the District hence contributing to the high growth rate.

1.1.4.3 Population Density

Population density refers to the number of people per square kilometre. Kakumiro District has an area of 1,699.4 sq.km. The population density stands at 329.9 persons per square kilometre.

1.1.4.4 Urbanisation rates and levels

Urbanisation is defined as the increase in the proportion of the population living in the urban area. However the definition of urban areas has been changing over time. The 2002 and 2014 censuses defined urban areas as only the gazetted one while the earlier censuses included un gazetted urban centres with more than 1000 people as part of the urban population

1.2 Administrative Structure

Bugangaizi East County covers most of the district area as it comprises of 6 sub-counties and 03 Town Councils, followed by Bugangaizi west County, which comprises of 06 sub-counties and 02 Town Council and Bugangaizi South with 05 sub counties and 2 Town councils.

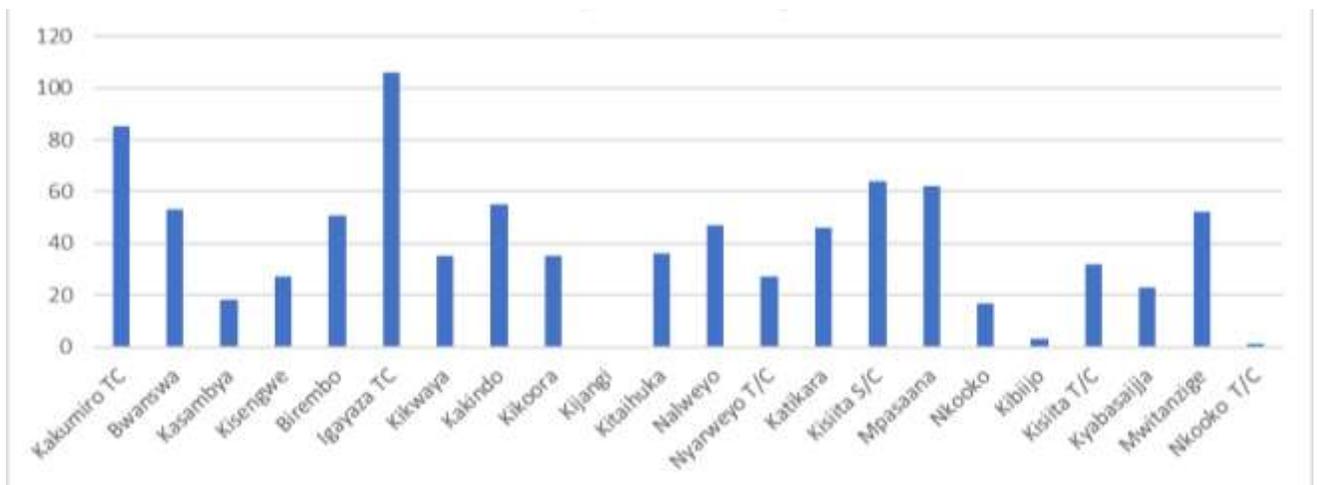
The majority of the births were not registered with the government systems. This could be because of some people not using recognised government facilities during child birth.

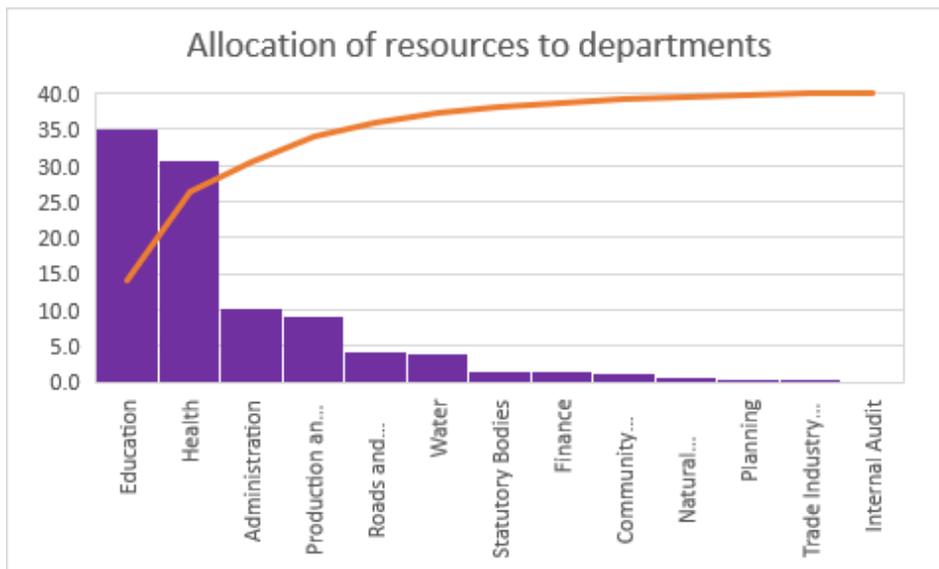

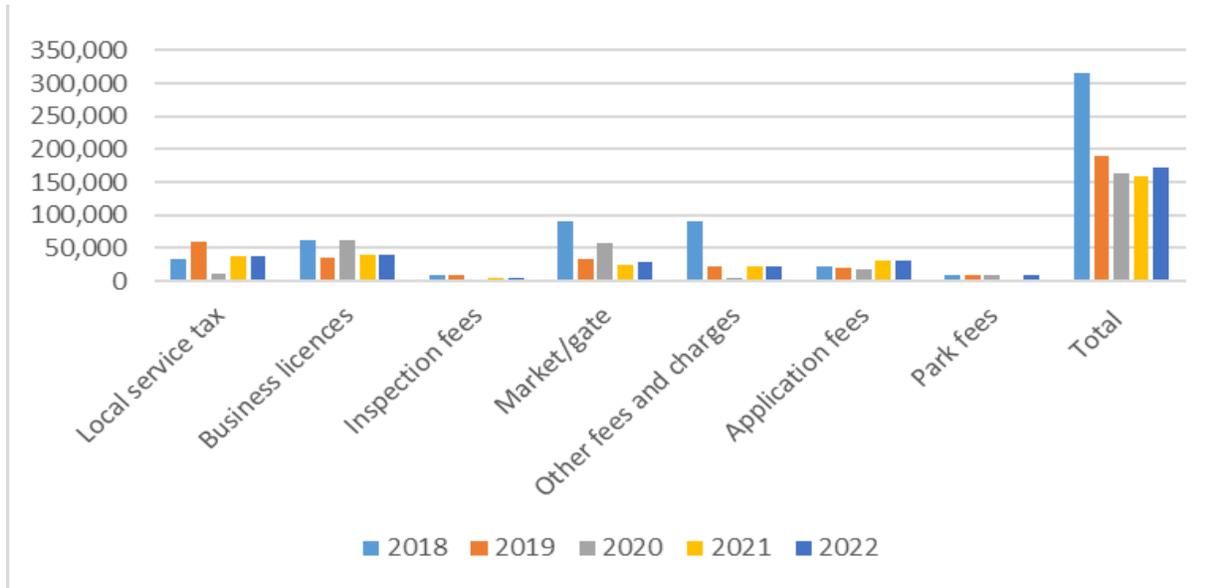


Figure 3.2 Share of locally generated revenue

Figure 3.3: Percentage of budget released against originally approved budget 2018-2022

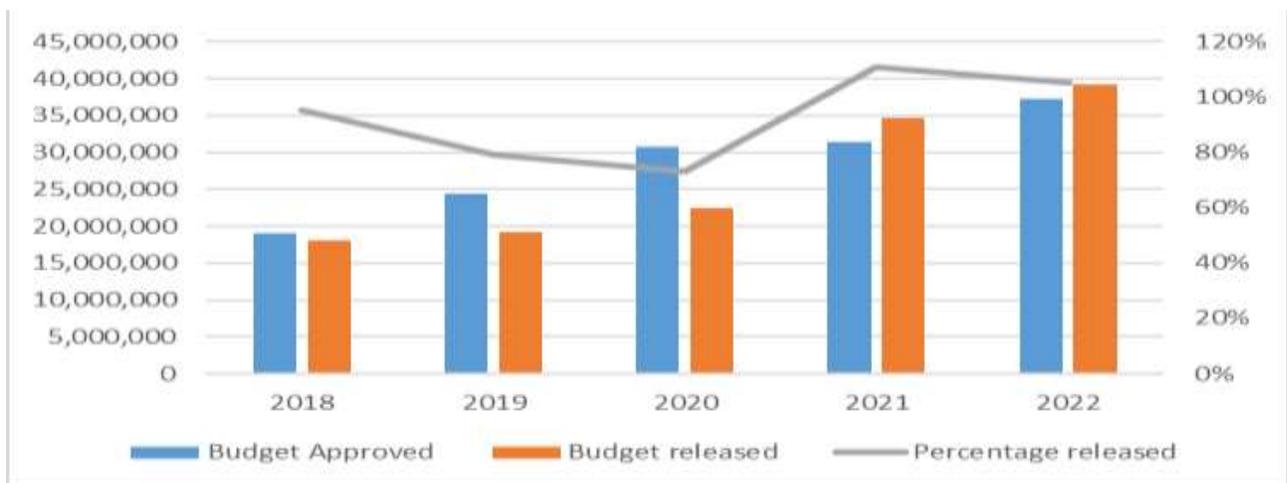


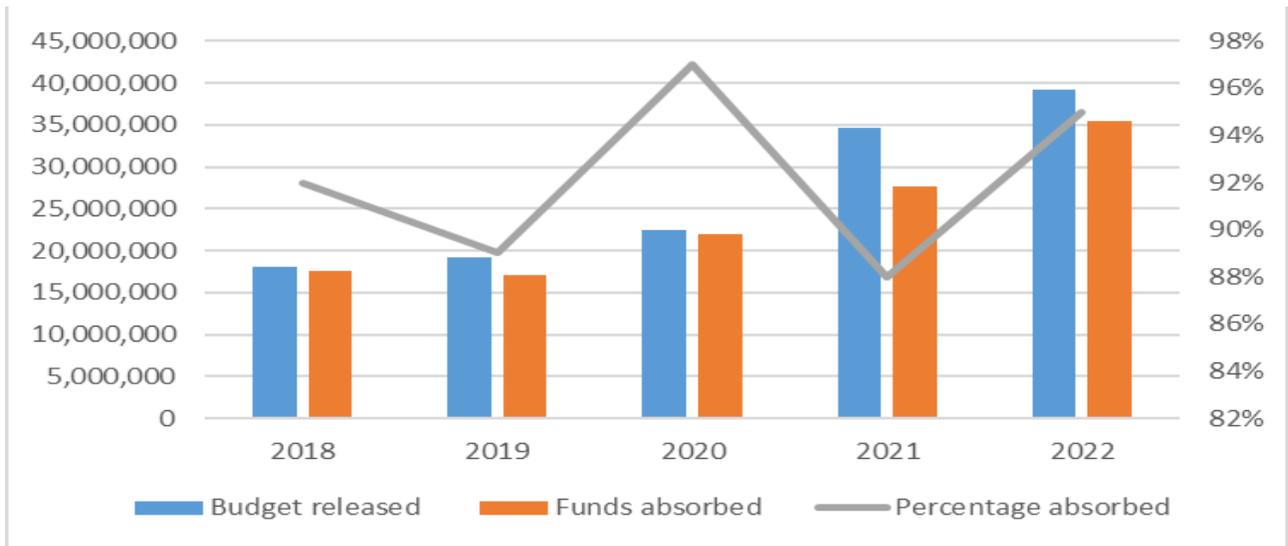

Figure 3.4 : Proportion of direct transfers to local government.



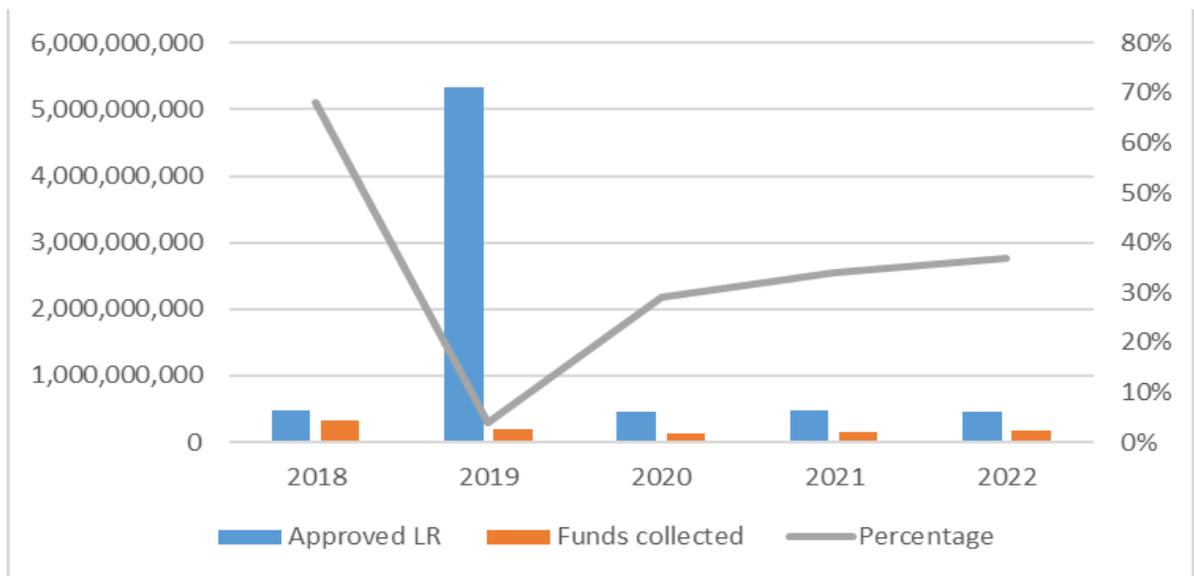

CHAPTER SIX: HEALTH SERVICES

The health department is mandated to;

- a) Improve latrine coverage from 68% to 95% by June 2022.
- b) Reduce the percentage of the Population in 5 km walking distance to a health facility from 70% to 50% by June 2022.
- c) Improve the staffing level for trained health workers from 64.2% to 90% by June 2022.
- d) Reduce the number of Health facilities reporting stock out of 6 tracer drugs by 20% by June 2022.
- e) Increase OPD utilisation in all health facilities from 0.7 to 0.9 by 2022.
- f) Reduce stunting from 38% to 32% through improved nutrition of the population by 2022.
- g) Reduce the incidence of HIV prevalence from 6.2% to 5.0% by 2022.
- h) Immunize all children below one year with DPT/HIB/HIP/ PCV 10 and measles vaccine annually.
- i) Increase Antenatal care attendance from 60% to 95% in three years.
- j) Increase health facility deliveries from 60 % to 75% within three years.
- k) Provide free HIV counselling and testing for all pregnant women attending ANC.
- l) Improve community capacity for Health activities through mobilization and training on a quarterly basis.
- m) Construct and rehabilitate health centres and maternity ward.
- n) Construct 02 mortuaries at HC IVs in the district.
- o) Construct Staff quarters at each of the health facilities.

Figure 6.1. Number of health facilities

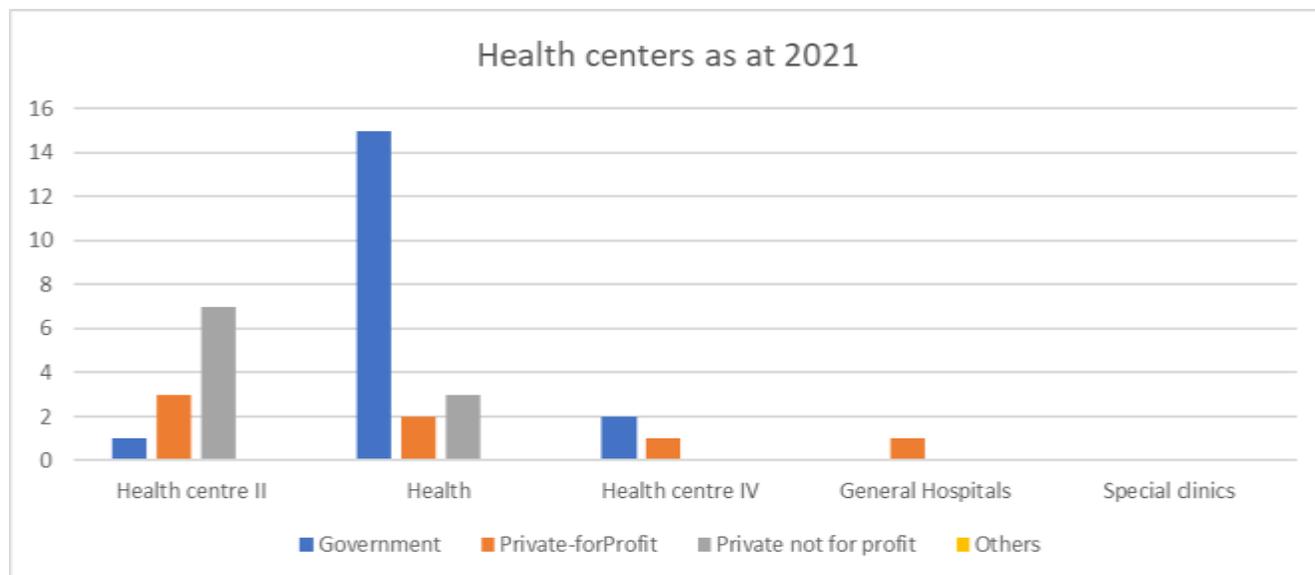

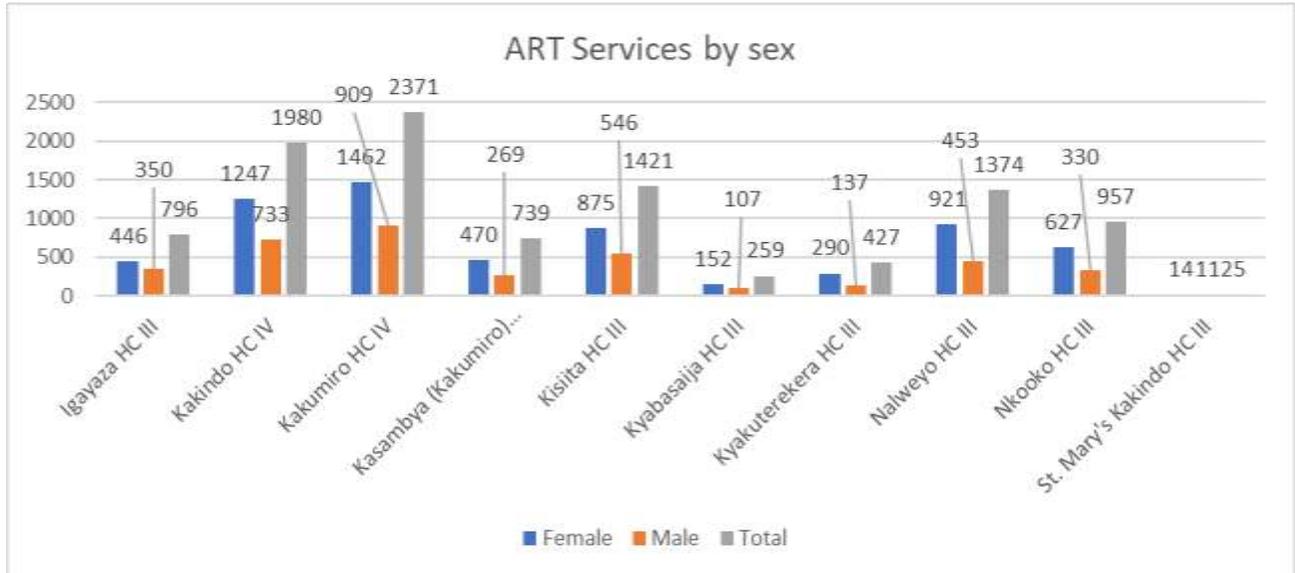

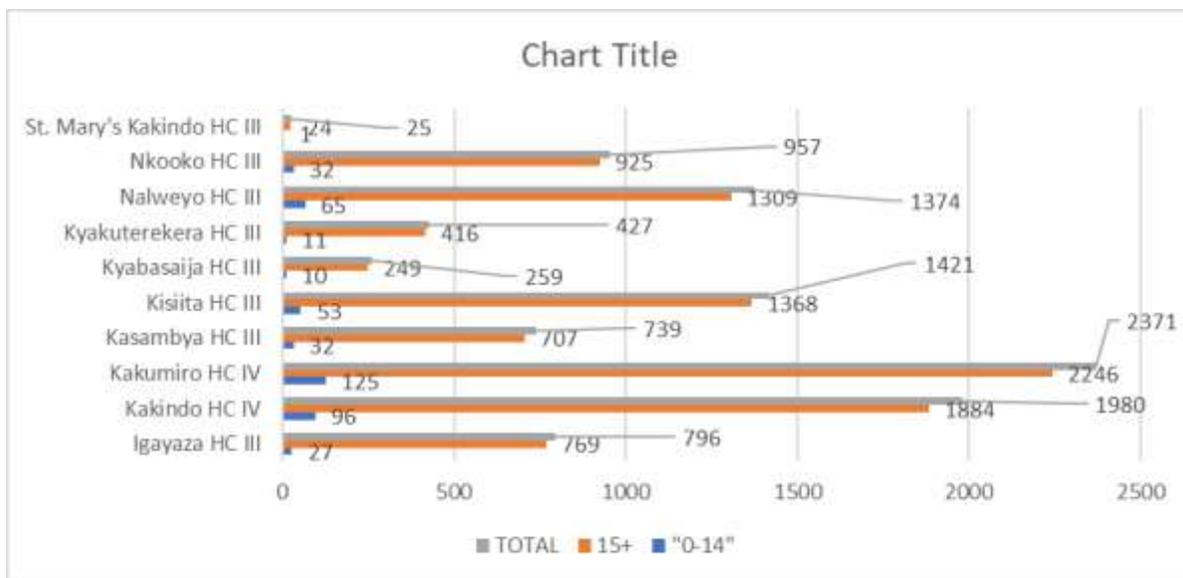

Malaria has consistently been the leading cause of death among inpatients aged below five years. In 2017/18 malaria accounted for 35 percent of the deaths but had dropped to 19 percent in 2018/19. In the financial years 2017/18 and 2018/19 neonatal conditions that include premature babies and other neonatal conditions have had an upward trend while pneumonia and anaemia have declined. Figure 2.5.7 shows that death due to neonatal conditions was the leading cause of death among inpatient children under age five.

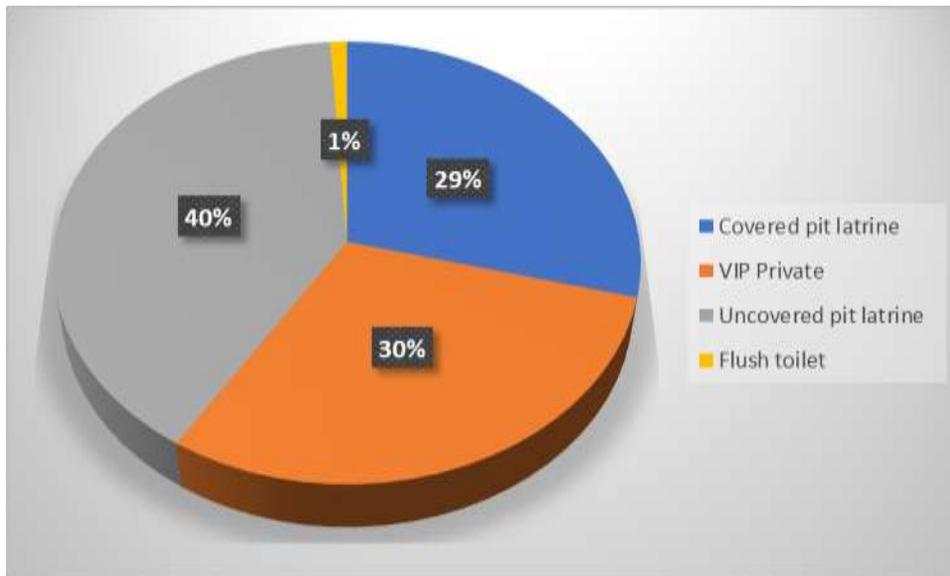

CHAPTER SEVEN: EDUCATION AND SPORTS

7.1 Introduction

Uganda's education system is comprised of an early childhood programme that caters for children aged 3-5 years (pre-primary education), followed by seven (7) years of primary education, followed by four (4) years of Ordinary Level secondary education, two (2) years of Advanced Level secondary education and the final tier is three (3) to five (5) years of Tertiary education. Each level is nationally examined with certificates awarded.

Pre-Primary School Education

Pre-primary education offers Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE). The official school going age for pre-primary is 3-5 years.

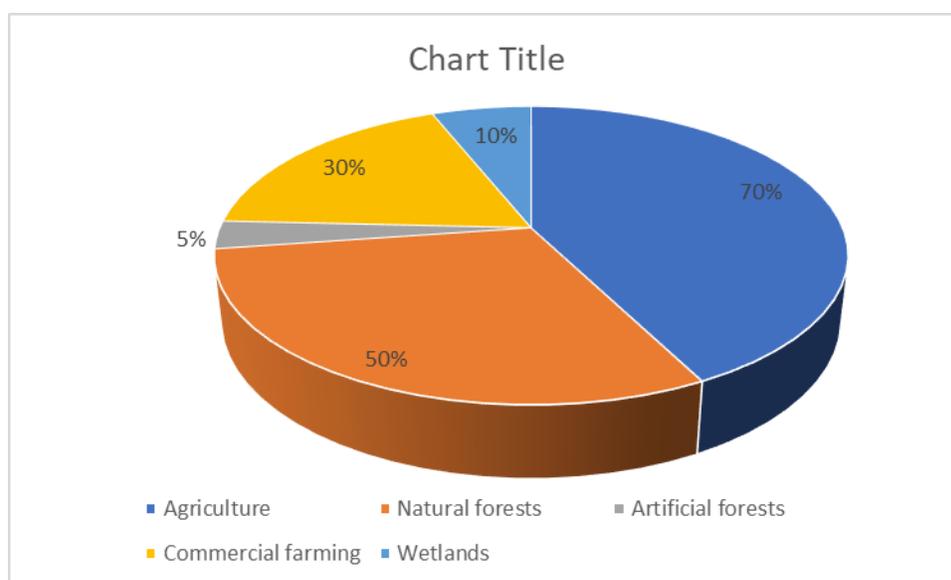

a) Population Density

Population density refers to the number of people per square kilometre Kakumiro district has an area of 3,184 sq.km. Therefore, the population density was 92.06 persons per sq.km of land in 2014 year. The population density increased from 92.06 persons per sq.km in the year 2014 to 161.18 persons per sq.km in the year 2022. The table 12.2 shows that Kakindo subcounty has the biggest population followed by Nyarweyo Town Council and Kasambya subcounty. This is due to influx of non-registered refugees from neighbouring refugee district of Kikuube and Hoima.

b) Urbanisation rates and levels

Urbanisation is defined as the increase in the proportion of the population living in the urban area. However, the definition of urban areas has been changing over time. The 2002 and 2014 censuses defined urban areas as only the gazetted one while the earlier censuses included un gazetted urban centres with more than 1000 people as part of the urban population
